'The only obligation which I have a right to assume, is to do at any time what I think is right.' - Henry David Thoreau.

STOP THE CLAMPDOWN! RECLAIM THE FUTURE!

"So long as people fight against oppression and exploitation, we will be there, fighting alongside them."

Solidarity was the name of the game, as groups from all over the country came together in Liverpool, to form alliances and unite in action under the banner of 'Reclaim The Future! Stop The Clampdown!' Bringing together the unemployed with workers struggles and raising awareness of animal rights, ecological issues and workers' concerns, thousands came out in support of the 500 dockers sacked for refusing to cross a picket line. Overcoming all reservations associated with the political implications of such an event, for many it was to become one of the best actions this year.

On Saturday 28th around 10,000 people joined the parade down through Liverpool to the pierhead. Earth Firstlers, trade unionists, dockers, road protesters, Kurdish groups, a large contingent of anarchists, Workers' Power and other assorted titinerants all joined the demonstration. There was a noticeable absence of the SWP and Militant in any great numbers - it seems the dockers' struggle was not going in the direction the left desired.

Unfortunately numbers dwindled at the end of the march as the speakers began a boredom offensive, provoking most people to run to the pubs. The sound system didn't kick in until later, playing to a considerably reduced crowd as many also had to take coaches home early. After a couple of bands had played, the party venue was spread by word of mouth to avoid attention by police and small groups inconspicuously made their way to the squatted Customs and Excise house. Within two hours of people arriving the squat was surrounded by tooled up riot police, but after some negotiations, a confrontation was averted, the police left and the party started.

On Sunday 29th there were discussions on various topics and a number of workshops took place throughout the day. In addition to this, there was planning for the next day's action, where valuable lessons were learnt from working with a wide variety of groups.

THE OCCUPATION OF SEAFORTH DOCKS

On the morning of Monday 30th the tug boat operators went on strike, and at around 6am the docks were attacked. Under the very noses of the police who had been watching all night, two trucks full of dodgy looking people drove straight up to a side gate which a security guard kindly opened.

Thirty activists had got through by the time he realised his mistake. After cutting two fences, one group ran to the gantries to be greeted by a security guard who demanded the password! This was considered unnecessary by the twelve activists who proceeded to occupy two of the gantries.

Simultaneously the other activists who had entered, occupied machinery, and one group approached the office, or 'rathouse' as it's known by the dockers, from behind. Outwitting the police they scaled two fences, ran up the fire escape, made a human pyramid and managed to climb onto the roof to fly two red, green and black flags as well as hanging a banner saying 'Sack the Bosses not the Workers'. Sadly the banner enjoyed under an hour of glory before being lost in a tug of war with the police. Out on the main gate around 800 protesters and dockers had gathered and spent most of the afternoon confronting the police as well as the scab workers.

Meanwhile, in the city centre a group of 20 activists occupied the offices of ACL (the major container company using Seaforth docks) and spent about half an hour talking to one of the directors discussing their shortsighted involvement with the Mersey Docks and Harbour Company!

Quietly, back on the picket line, in a tent backing onto the fence, a hacksaw got to work and around sixty people disappeared through the hole into the docks before police noticed anything amiss. A dash was made for the Rathouse with two people being pulled up onto the roof with only the aid of a rope. There was delight on discovering that one of the two was a determined docker who then spent the rest of the afternoon waving one of the flags and making new friends.

After about nine hours of occupation and several picket line arrests, a deal was brokered between port police and the occupiers whereby the people on the gantries and offices didn't get arrested and the police got.... nothing.

The celebrations soon turned sour on the walk back to the squat. Angry that they had just had the complete piss taken out of them, police proceeded to use snatch squads randomly on the crowd. Many people found themselves on the end of bitter violence as police waded in with unprovoked attacks, hospitalising at least one person.

On arrival at the squat many had to immediately board coaches home. The remainder, realising it was probably not a good idea to stay at the squat, were escorted by the dockers to a pub where they could stay the night. The rest of the evening was spent getting totally pissed with the aid of £200 put behind the bar by the dockers and a bloody good party was had by all!

The whole event has proved the genuine support that exists between groups. It is no exaggeration to say that the amount of support between us and the dockers was unsurpassable. Any prejudices either group had previously held were certainly overcome that day. To the surprise of the dockers, women occupied the gantries and roof, while men wearing dresses and nail varnish were lifted over the gates! We were impressed by their militancy, tolerance and sincerity.

We should all be able to decide what happens to our lives and environment, and must continue to recognise the importance of participating in each other's struggles against human and ecological exploitation.

As well as this, on the Monday, ACL, the major container line using Seaforth docks, stopped using the docks and the Merseyside Docks and Harbour Company shares dropped dramatically. Elsewhere in the world there were solidarity protests with international blockading of ports. Bill Morris, the dockers union leader, has since ordered the dockers to disassociate themselves from our movement but the dockers have refused, stating that they stand by us in total solidarity. As they said: "next time you lot need a hand digging up any roads, give us a call!"

NEWS IN BRIEF

On 27th September the DoT announced that they were dropping funding for any 'improvements' to the A303 past Stonehenge 'for the foreseeable future'. They confirmed that all the surface routes proposed for duelling of the road had been rejected and that they could not currently afford the three mile £300 million long tunnel alternative.

At the road camp near Bingley, West Yorkshire the Highways Agency have run out of money for the clearance contract and so work won't be starting for a least a year. Contact Leeds Earth First! on: 0113 225 4686.

WHATLEY QUARRY

No work has yet started in the Mendip Hills, on the expansion of Whatley Quarry by quarrying company ARC. On 25th of September, Hanson's, the owners of ARC, had their EGM interrupted by protestors both questioning inside and a small, but very noisy crowd outside. At least two shareholders decided to sell their shares after talking to people outside about future plans for Whatley Quarry. Who knows how many more would sell if Lord Hanson had not brushed environmental questions aside during the meeting.

Meanwhile a Whatley local is in the process of taking an appeal against the Quarry's expansion to the high court.

Other locals took matters into their own hands, just before the Extraordinary General Meeting, by cutting the Quarry's private railway line which disrupted work for a day. They ensured that there would be no danger to human life by placing red stop lights miles up the track and informing the local radio station, as well as giving an interview as to why action was taken.

JSA ACTIONS

On the first day of the Job Seekers Allowance various groups across the country voiced their disapproval. In Brighton over three hundred people gathered in Churchill Square and accompanied by police paid a visit to the DSS office in North Street that was already being occupied by the Justice?

From there they headed en masse to the second office in West Street where two people climbed onto the roof to hang a banner. The third office visited was being manned by scab workers as the staff were on a one day strike against the JSA. There they were treated to a piece of Street Theatre about the effect the JSA would have had on Jesus, if he had had the misfortune to be around in Britain today.

Meanwhile in North London an old DSS building was squatted, and a banner denouncing the JSA was hung from the roof. At the same time as this a demo was in progress outside Westminster Central Hall.

NABURN WOODS

'Naburn Woods - Healthcare in Action!' is just one of the signs painted around this former hospital site near York where direct action folks have had their busiest month yet fending off developers BAA Mc Arthur Glenn.

As the NHS served eviction notices, the previously quiet camp went into a frenzy of activity, up trees and into tunnels and drawing in an astounding rush of community support. A constant stream of York people brought blanket/tarps /food/clothes/climbing gear/tools/beer and good wishes. They climbed trees, helped build lock-ons and barricades, painted and added support on the camp noticeboard.

The NHS remained tight lipped about why they were ruining the long term health of York. By trading woodland for factory outlet shops that would draw traffic from seventy miles away. They admitted that they were only thinking short term and that the protesters were right to be concerned.

Sir John Greetham, non-executive director,

visited the site in his Range Rover belching fumes and accusing the protesters of wasting NHS money by using NVDA.

That evening it was nationally exposed that his £25,000 car and £10,000 perks, all paid by the NHS, made him the country's number one public service fatcat. Not just NHS corruption is involved, Caddick Developments have bought up all the adjacent farmland and are confident of trashing the swathe of countryside south of York once the Naburn shops and access road are completed.

When the eviction came on the 25th September continual positive local coverage and support meant that even the forty bailiffs men were half hearted and the chief of police was apologetic about there having to be an eviction at all. Nothing was trashed and £30,000 worth of fencing went up around the site despite there being rights of way. Even these have been kept open, locals being accompanied by security every time they walk their dogs.

There is increasing awareness among the locals that the land is as much theirs as anyone elses. There is now a camp on the gate-being looked after by sympathetic security! Bizarrely they found out that when they dress up as protesters passing cars start tooting their horns and people offer support!

The focus is on pressing for the release of nineteen more Ogonis who face the same charges as Ken Saro-Wiwa and the others after also daring to challenge Shell. Suggested events include candlelit vigils on Friday 8th November and actions on Saturday 9th November, along with occupations, mock hangings, workshops, videos and literature readings. Grassroots activists in one country will be shutting down all Shell garages nationally, so at least go down and picket your local!

CAMBRIDGE RECLAIM THE STREETS

In spite of a massive police operation, aided by the Essex Police helicopter, several dog sections, Suffolk and Norfolk Cops and under the watchful gaze of the Forward Intelligence Team (plainclothes and on their shiny new mountain bikes) over 1,000 people successfully reclaimed Mill Road in Cambridge for six sunny hours on Saturday 14th September. They turned one of the city's most congested roads into a free party zone. Local residents were supportive with many asking

when the next one was going to be. Police managed to intercept one of the tripods but made the mistake of trying to bring charges of theft against the tripod team, when the scaffold poles were actually legal. The other tripod was successfully raised and was soon followed by a crowd that had gathered at the railway station. A thin blue line held them back for a few minutes but a strong surge broke through. Drummers and two sound systems then kept the party going for the whole afternoon, with several hundred out-manoeuvred cops just standing by and watching. The sounds went off at 6.30pm and most people then left. Around forty people resisted the police line which was then blocking most exits and trying to clear the residue of the party instead of waiting for them to leave of their own accord. A typical over-reaction by the police yet again as they all changed into full riot gear. The riot cops then spent about the next hour baton charging the forty all the way to the ring road, while locals looked on bemused.

Cambridge police just couldn't resist a macho show of force after losing the day to RTS - even the local MP is making a complaint to the Cambridge Chief Constable. Tally for the day was thirty-eight arrests. A defence campaign for those arrested is now being formed, with the prospect of suing for unlawful arrest. BOUGAINVILLE REPORT

News just coming from Bougainville Island in the Pacific says that there has been renewed and very heavy fighting between the Papua New Guinea Defence Forces and the Bougainville Revolutionary Army over the weekend of Friday 6th to Sunday 8th September.

A camp of PNGDF was over run and captured by the BRA forces on Sunday 8 September. The PNGDF had been warned in June this year and given one month by the South Bougainville BRA forces to move out of the area. This is the first known major contact between the BRA forces and the PNGDF since the much heralded PNGDF 'Operation High Speed 2', which was launched in June 1996 and defeated by the BRA forces on 15 July. There is a rumour however that the PNGDF is planning 'Operation High Speed 3' in the near future. According to BRA information thirteen PNGDF soldiers were killed and five surrendered. The BRA say that they have also captured twenty four rifles, ammunition, and one mortar launcher with live mortar rounds. For more details contact: Bougainville Freedom Movement, P.O. GORLEBEN

On Monday 7th October rail services across much of Northern Germany were sabotaged. Overhead powercables were pulled down with grappling hooks. Campaigners opposed to the transport of nuclear waste by rail to a storage site near Hanover are believed to be responsible.

In May this year thousands of police and protesters fought battles near Gorleben as the arrival of nuclear waste from France was opposed.

CIVIL WAR IN DENMARK

In early September forty people occupied an artificial island in the middle of Oeresund, Denmark. Up until it was occupied it was part of the construction of the Oeresundbridge, an ecologically damaging bridge construction project.

The new republic was named 'Ecotopia' and there was then an official declaration of independence made as well as an application for membership to the UN. The machinery was nationalised and offered to scrap dealers at a cheap price. The inside of the huge island (five kilometres long) was still filled with water so they commandeered a motor boat and went for a ride watched by some very unamused police. They stayed on the island for six hours and the police had difficulty getting rid of them.

When they were eventually taken off the island they were arrested and have since been fined, but as they say "it was well worth it!"

As well as everyone having great fun, work on the bridge was stopped, it raised a lot of attention in the media all over Denmark and Sweden and it also brought together lots of groups that had never worked with each other before.

COSTAIN AGM


Newbury contractors Costain held their AGM on 9th September in Westminster. Campaigners had been eagerly looking forward to this opportunity for months and on the day, more protesters (200+) than shareholders turned up.... so the meeting belonged to us!

Friends of the Earth had done loads of good build-up work getting all the 'eco-shareholders' to the meeting, but merely wanted them to ask questions (that'll change things!?), and got last minute jitters about damage to their reputation if the meeting became chaotic.

Meanwhile, lots of EF!ers were plotting how to cause maximum chaos! Same planet, different worlds.....what would happen, we wondered? Things started slowly, with 'polite but firm' questions ensuring that we seized the agenda of the meeting before it had even started. It soon became clear that Costain were going to have a very rough ride, with speeches by the Chairman and a representative of Intria (Costain's Malaysian backers) cut short by hecklers. In fact, there was very little but Newbury-related heckling for most of the two-hour meeting.......that's what we call good business!

As the formal votes of the meeting approached, protesters swarmed towards the stage, intent on stopping the meeting. The usual game of rugby with Pinkerton's Security followed, with

stinkbombs and plastic plants flying! The Chairman was reduced to bellowing out the votes, red-faced and frantic, as the meeting dissolved around him. Total chaos - lovely!



The protest was extremely successful; an AGM has never been trashed to this extent before. Nonetheless, it was a shame not to actually shut down the meeting with so many activists present. OTTERS IN NEWBURY

Signs of visitation from Otters have been found at Rackmarsh, Bagnor on the Lambourne river. The Highways Agency response is: 'We'll build tunnels so they can cross safely,' never mind trashing their habitat, a designated SSSI.

The European Parliament has written to the British Government asking them to explain the justification for going ahead with the bypass. This strengthens the case currently with the European Ombudsman. The ideal scenario is that eventually the Ombudsman refers the Newbury case to the European Court of Justice.

Almost half of the route is now fenced though recently 85 panels of 10 ft high mesh-welded security fencing (cost £160 per panel) was 'pixied' at the Chase compound. For some reason the Police don't consider this 'legitimate protest' and are looking to isolate those involved in such 'senseless acts of vandalism' (their words).

At the Diggers Community, Gotan, a compound has been established immediately adjacent, but not including, the en-route vegetable garden. One pixie, dressed as a red hat, a team leader for Pinkertons, lead bemused white hats astray and upon reaching Gotan he threw off his hat proclaiming 'I'm joining them'! More defections and deification are expected. Tree houses have been appearing at Spiritual Roots. This camp, adjacent

to Gotan, is on a proposed access road which must be constructed prior to destruction work continuing. Indeed there are still a small number of trees on route requiring occupation.

Two tunnels, one below a flower bed at Gotan and the other at Spiritual Roots were captured. Next morning at Spiritual Roots, the Diggers, true to their name, dug out the poorly mixed concrete, reclaiming the cement for lock-ons and tunnel re-enforcement. The massive Police and Security night time operation must have cost the earth since it required two Cavers, said to be paid £3,000 each. After reclaiming the Spiritual Roots tunnel the police threatened its occupants with criminal damage to the soil! The tunnel remains occupied.

A further ten injunctions have been sought at the High Court, and this brings the total to twenty. There is no apparent reasoning behind the choice of people injuncted, with some having not been actively involved for months! For more information call Third Battle of Newbury on: 01635 45544.

The fourteen year old resistance centre Faslane Peace Camp was set to close just two months ago but instead there has since been an massive increase of activity.

On Tuesday 10th September another batch of Trident nuclear warheads arrived in its evil convoy of military vehicles. The convoy was stopped three times at Balloch near Loch Lomond and despite the police being out in force the stoppage lasted for one hour. Two people managed to d-lock themselves onto lorries carrying warheads. Thirteen people were arrested, mainly on breach of the peace charges. Local support for the action was very encouraging and hopefully these people will be up for a bit of action on future convoys passing through their town.

As well as this Faslane Peace Camp are inviting you to the 'Burn The Base' Bonfire Action, between Saturday 2nd and Tuesday 5th November. During the weekend there will be workshops on issues such as Trident, the convoy and NVDA and the law. There will be tours of military land, actions, a torch lit procession and a party to celebrate the efforts of Guy Fawkes. This promises to be an eventful few days and they would appreciate as much active support as possible. If you have any fire torches and other fire equipment take them along with you, as well as the usual tent, sleeping bag and a sense of humour you need it in a world governed by megalomaniacs who seem hell bent on destroying the Earth.
